## Discussion, Q&A, Book Signing THURSDAY, JANUARY 26, 6 PM




**T**he Stamford Museum & Nature Center's Salon Series for adult programming helps usher in the new year with "Naturescape Your Yard," a discussion and slide presentation by Connecticut garden photographer, writer, and eco-friendly garden coach Karen Bussolini about how to look to nature as a guide for creating sustainable, low-care, high-satisfaction gardens.

Karen has photographed six books on gardening and garden design, including *The Naturescaping Workbook: A Step-by-Step Guide for Bringing Nature to Your Backyard* (Timber Press), by Oregon landscape designer Beth O'Donnell Young. The Chicago Tribune has called *The Naturescaping Workbook* "an uncommonly useful aid to anyone in thinking through how to create a landscape that suits the climate, the site, the local wildlife and ecosystem, and the gardener."



Karen's discussion in the SM&NC's Bendel Mansion on January 26, 2017, about *Naturescaping Your Yard* promises to be an instructive, inspirational evening for Connecticut gardeners pining and already planning for spring planting.

Dean of the Yale School of Forestry & Environmental Studies
